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Why have an (incomplete) list?

We call our book lists incomplete, because we know they will never manage to be exhaustive or definitive when it comes to recommending great books by writers of colour. Instead, we are hoping to offer a snapshot of exciting new texts that have just been published and spotlight older classic texts to support teachers and young people diversify their reading.

All the books listed have suggested year groups as a guide, but we realise this will vary from one individual student to another. So really this is more of a starting point for teachers to familiarise themselves with what is available and build confidence in their subject knowledge of literature by writers of colour.

With the creation of this third volume of the (incomplete) Lit in Colour book list for Primary school age students we decided to bring in Poetry and Graphic Novel Focus pages; these bring together a collection of books that will encourage and inspire children of all writing and reading abilities to use their imaginations and to immerse themselves in stories. We have also incorporated more international voices as we wanted to expand the narratives students encounter beyond Britain, and celebrate cultures from around the world.

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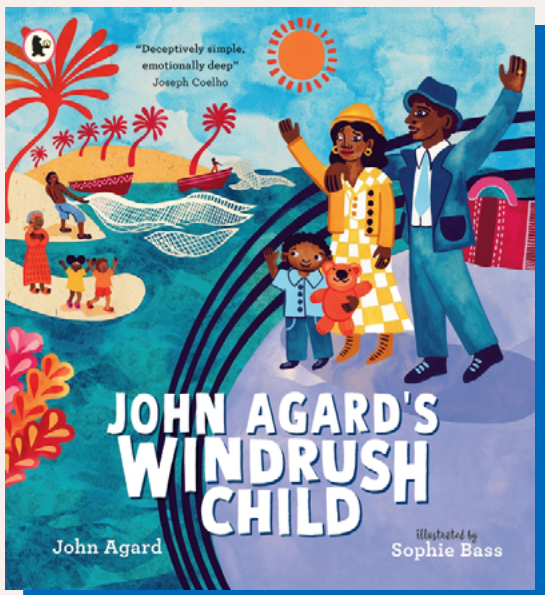
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John Agard's Windrush Child

John Agard and Sophie Bass (illus)



Windrush child says goodbye to his grandmother and the shores of his Caribbean home and boards the Empire Windrush on a journey into the unknown.

Playwright and poet John Agard's picture book, with images by debut illustrator Sophie Bass, recalls the journey made by thousands of Caribbean children and their families who travelled to Britain as part of the Windrush Generation between 1948 and 1971. Bass' illustrations show the changing landscapes faced by those on the Empire Windrush and other ships that made the journey.

This book is an informative introduction to Windrush, and a great starting point for talking to children about the contribution of the Windrush Generation, and the difficulties and discrimination faced by them in the UK.

The first, *How to Read a Book*, is a poetic adventure about the world of reading, gently urging children to find a space and time to delve into the pages of a book.

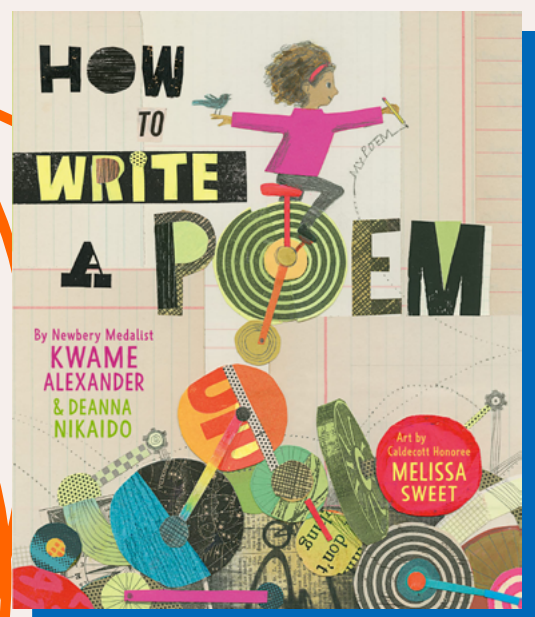
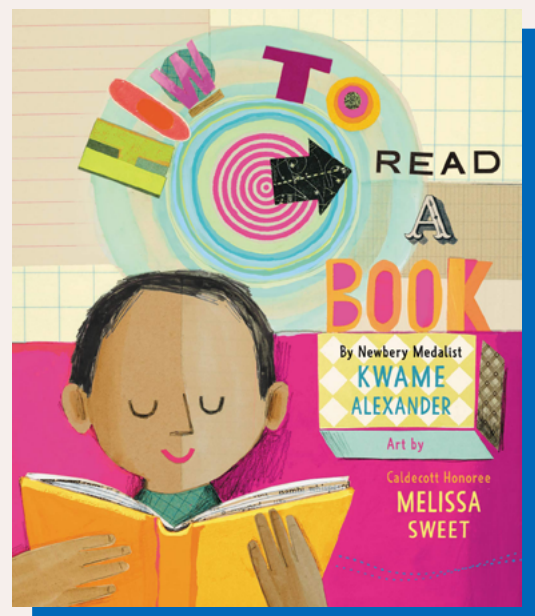

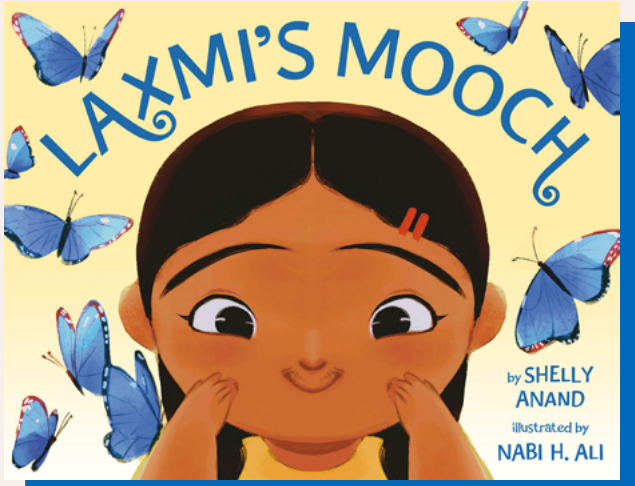

This body positive picture book is about a young Indian American girl called Laxmi, who learns to love her differences and celebrate her heritage after being teased about her moustache.

When her friends point out that the whiskers above her lip would make her the perfect cat, Laxmi starts to notice body hair all over – on her arms, legs, and even between her eyebrows. With her parents' help, Laxmi learns that hair isn't just for heads, but that it grows everywhere, regardless of gender.

Shelley Anand's affirming text is accompanied by illustrations from Nabi H. Ali, a Tamil-American illustrator.

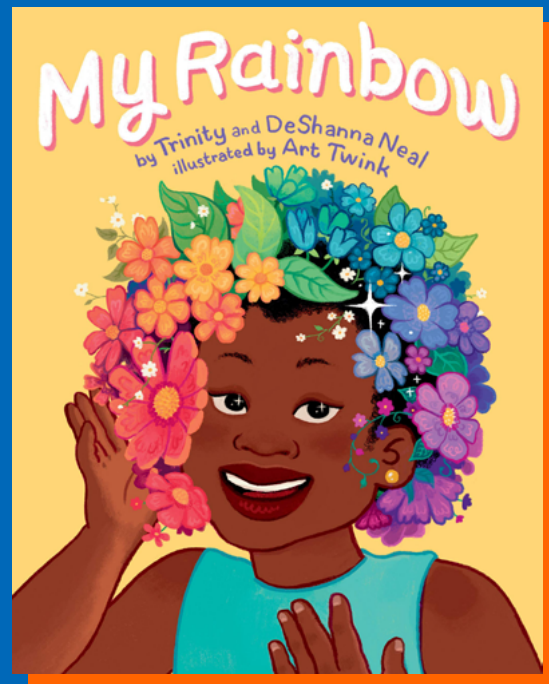

This picture book is based on the real-life story of daughter and mother Trinity and Deshanna Neal, and is about a young transgender girl's journey of self-expression.

When one morning Trinity decides she wants long hair like her dolls, her family decides to take a trip to the beauty supply store, but none of the wigs is the perfect fit. So Trinity's mother leaves with bundles of hair in hand, ready to craft a wig as colourful and vibrant as her daughter.

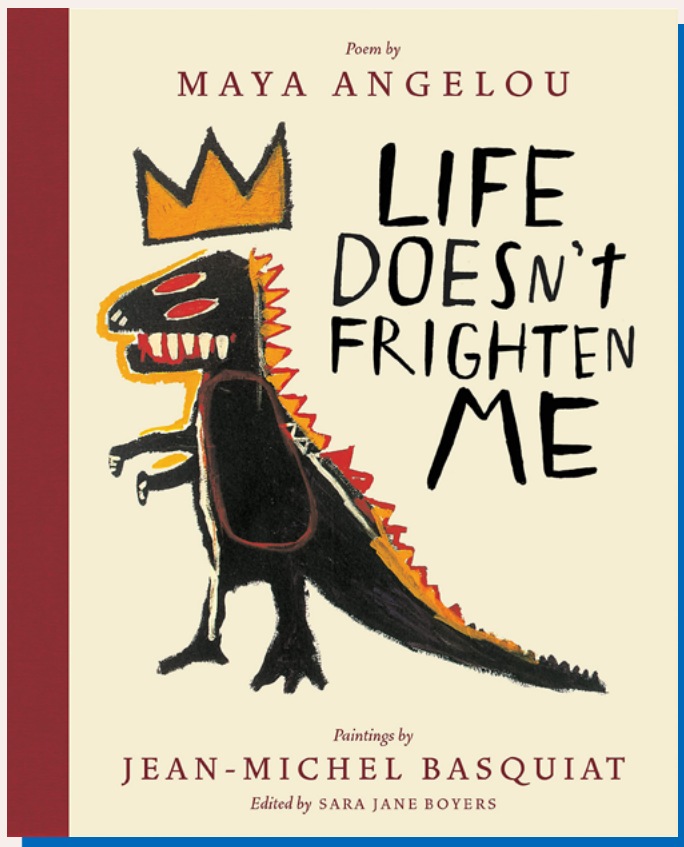

Maya Angelou's brave, defiant poem *Life Doesn't Frighten Me* celebrates the courage within each of us. Angelou's strong words are matched by bold paintings by artist Jean-Michel Basquiat.

First published in 1993, the 25th anniversary edition of the book features biographies of Angelou and Basquiat and an afterword from editor Sara Jane Boyers. It also includes a selected bibliography of Angelou's books and a selected museum listing of Basquiat's works to help children further discover the work of both artists.

Secret Beast Club series

Robin Birch and Jobe Anderson (illus)

This series is inspired by the real life story of Pablo Fanque, who was the first Black circus owner. Each story features a new magical creature for children to meet.

The *Unicorns of Silver Street* introduces Aisha, who loves being at home playing on her tablet or messaging her friends, and Jayden, who likes to get lost in books. Neither of them are fans of going outside.

But then they are asked to join the Secret Beast Club, a centuries-old secret group that protects mythological creatures. Leaving their comfort zones, Aisha and Jayden discover that real magic could be closer than they think.

In the second book in the series, *The Dragons of Emerald Yard*, Aisha and Jayden are officially members of the Secret Beast Club, and preparing for their second mission... tracking down a dragon who is on the loose in Birmingham, before a dragon hunter finds it.

A third book, *The Mer-People of Crystal Pier*, will be released in 2024.



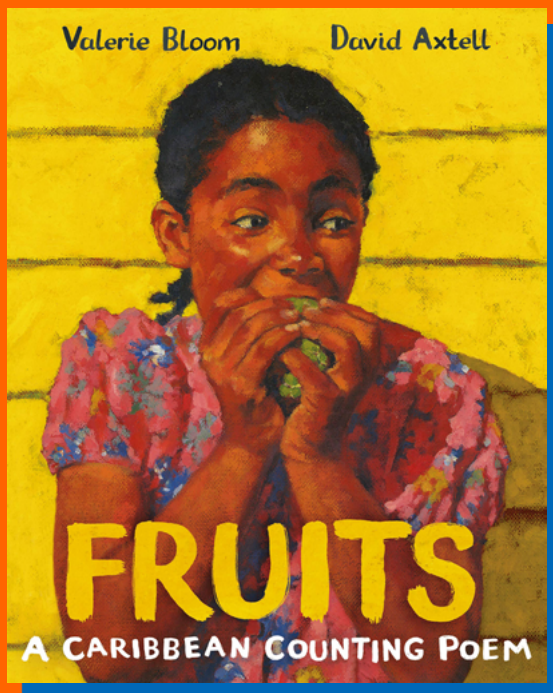

Valerie Bloom's counting poem *Fruits*, which won the Smarties Prize Bronze Award in 1997, is narrated by a small girl.

Illustrated by David Axtell, the creator of *We're Going on a Lion Hunt*, the book follows the girl on a mission to eat as much fruit as she can in one day.

The rhyming text helps children learn to count, and introduces them to the fruits of the Caribbean.

Bloom was born in Jamaica and came to England in 1979. She has performed extensively in both Britain and the Caribbean in schools, universities and theatres, and is the author of two novels and various collections of children's poetry including *Stars with Flaming Tails* which won the [CLIPPA](#) Children's Poetry Prize in 2022.

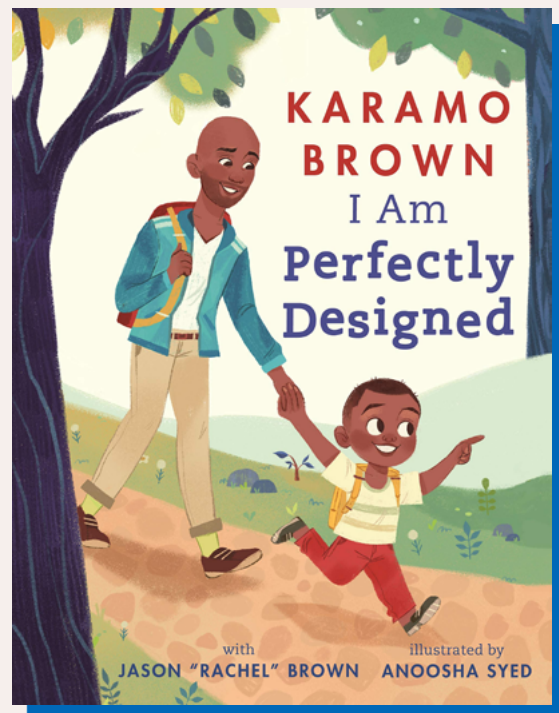

As the pair walk through the city together, playing in the park and eating ice cream on the way, they discuss the ways in which they are perfectly designed for each other.

Karamo Brown is the culture expert on Netflix's *Queer Eye* reality show, and made history in 2004 when he appeared on MTV's *The Real World* as the first openly gay African American reality TV star.

The book is illustrated by Anoosha Syed, an illustrator who also works as a freelance character designer with companies including Disney Jr.

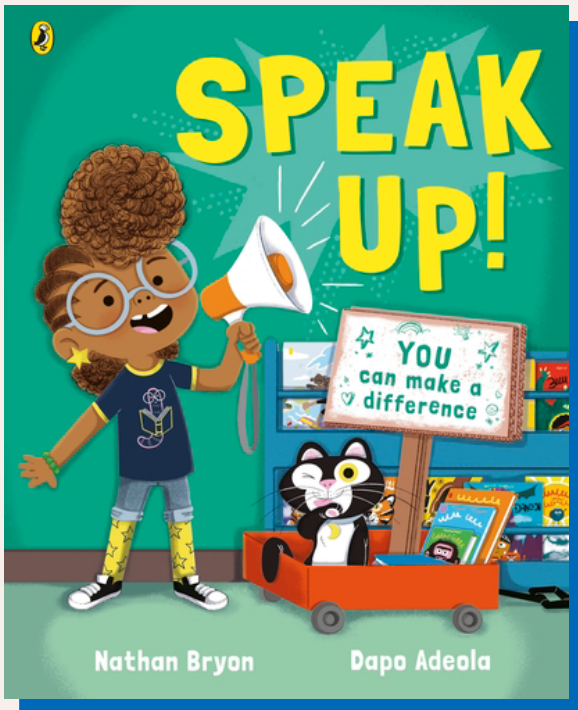

This is an empowering picture book about stepping up and speaking out for what matters to you, as well as being a love letter to libraries and the power of reading.

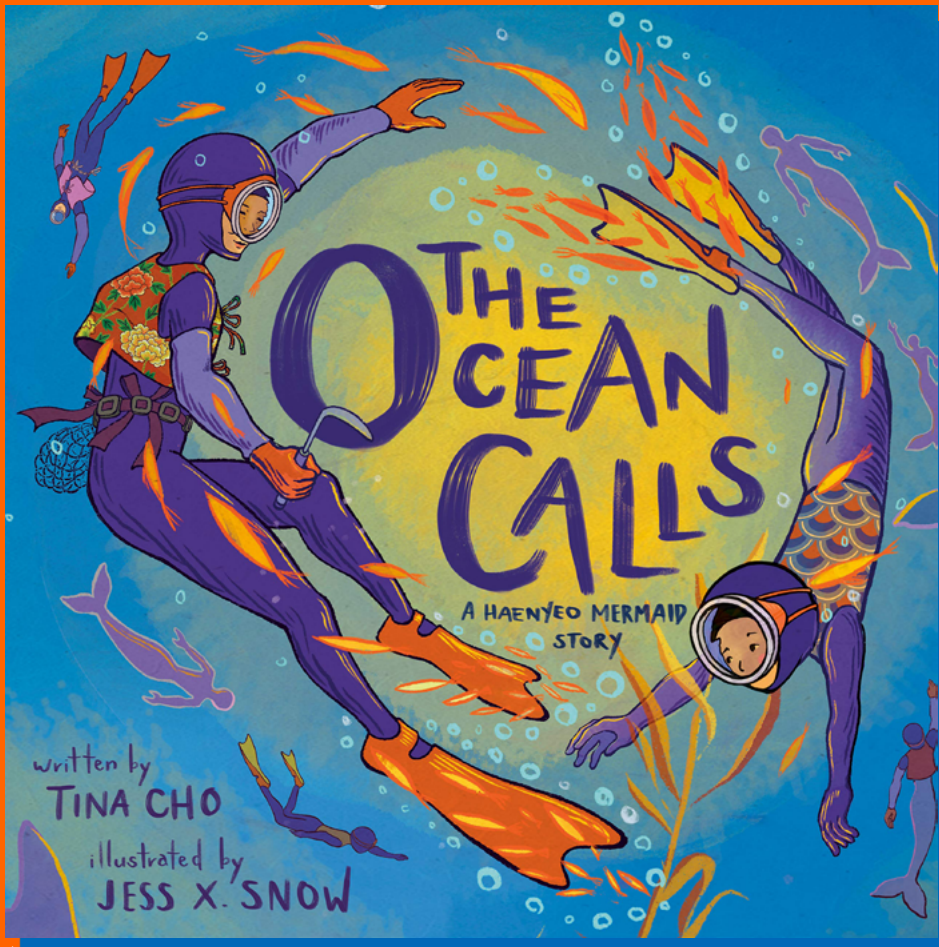

Determined to follow in her grandmother's footsteps, Dayeon eats Grandma's abalone porridge and practises holding her breath while they do the dishes. When a scary memory of the sea keeps Dayeon on shore, it's her grandmother's guidance that will help her step forward.

Children will learn about an extraordinary group of women and a traditional practice through this picture book.

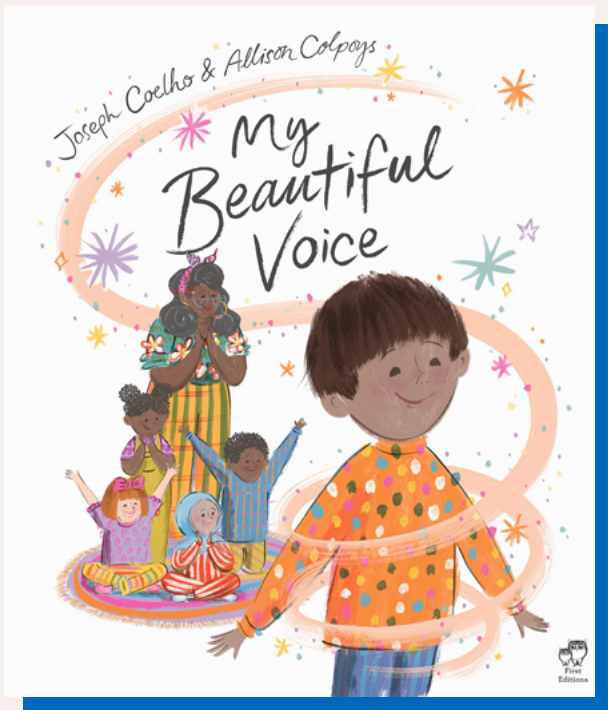

My Beautiful Voice is about a shy child unlocking the power of their own voice through poetry and the helping hand of an extra special teacher.

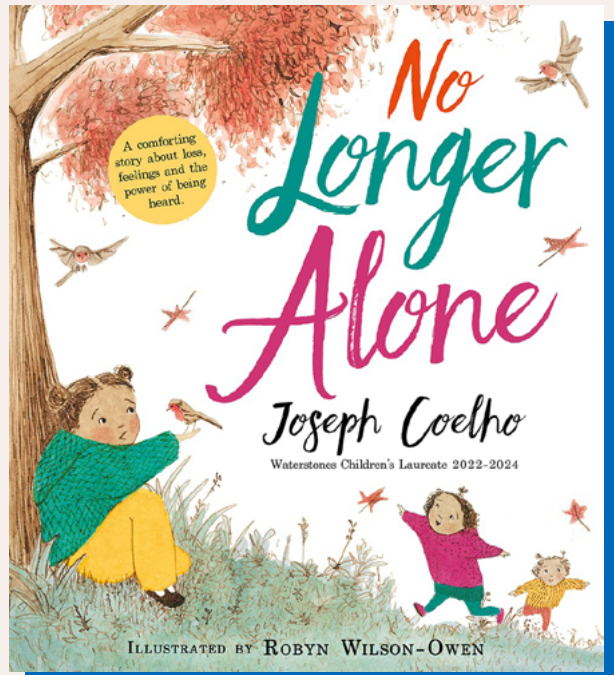

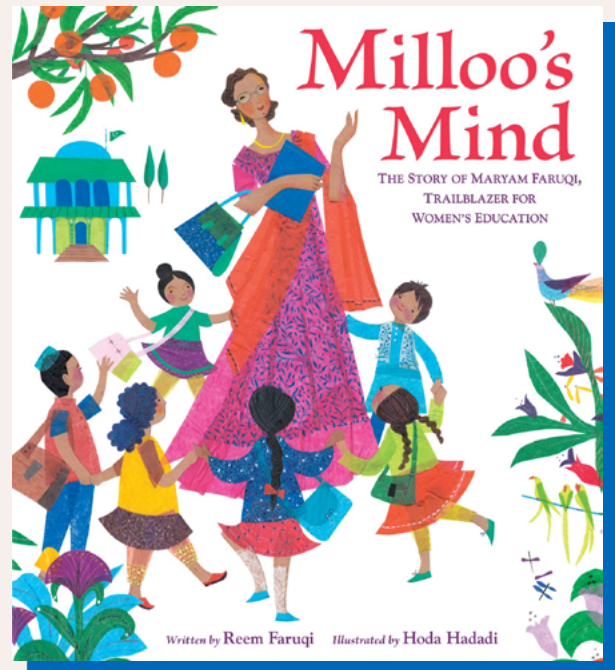

This picture book is a biography of Maryam "Milloo" Faruqi, the founder of the Happy Home Schools, which provided education to thousands of girls across Pakistan at a time when girls weren't encouraged to go to school. Author Reem Faruqi is also Maryam's granddaughter.

Milloo dreams of becoming a teacher, but her parents tell her she has had enough school. Heartbroken, she finds a way to achieve her educational goals. When she gets married, Milloo's husband tells her to stay home, but instead she opens a school in her house, before fulfilling her dreams by opening more schools around Karachi in Pakistan.

Milloo's Mind works well with *Malala's Magic Pencil* by Malala Yousafzai, illustrated by Kerascoët.

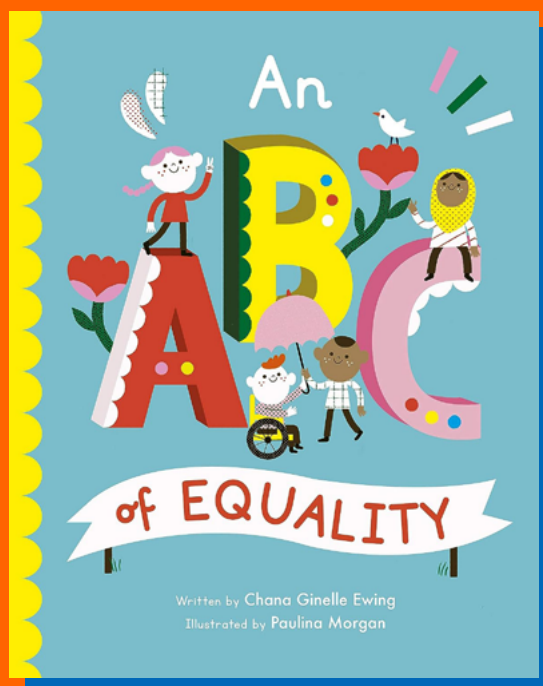

Each right-hand page includes a brightly decorated letter with the word it stands for and an encouraging slogan. On the left, a colourful illustration and bite-size text sum up the concept.

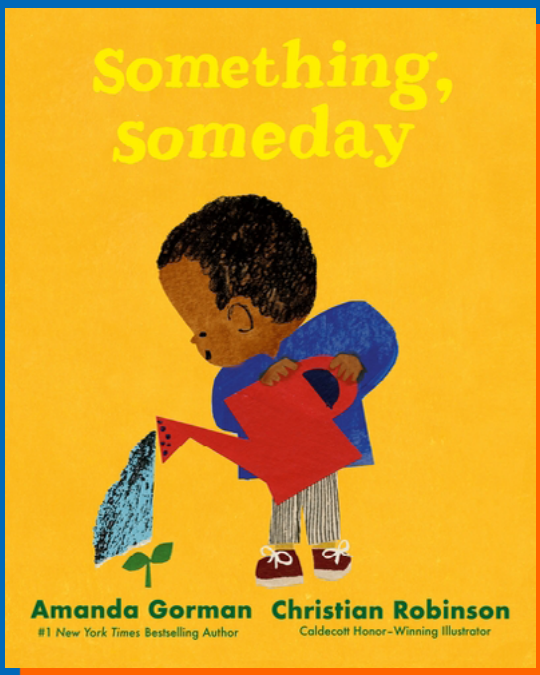

Laura Henry-Allain is a producer, educator and consultant. She is also the author of *My Skin, Your Skin*, illustrated by Onyinye Iwu.

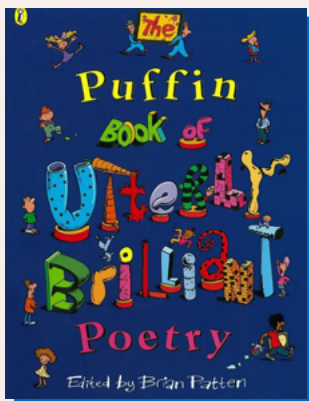

Poetry focus

Children and young people who read poetry have higher levels of reading engagement than those who do not read poetry, according to research from the [National Literacy Trust](#).

The 2022 research also found that more children who read poetry said that they enjoy reading (62.3% vs. 42.0%), read daily (37.7% vs. 24.3%) and see themselves as good readers (85.5% vs. 78.2%).

These books will encourage children to read, write and perform poetry – be it haiku, stories told in verse, sonnets and more – and encourage them to creatively express themselves.

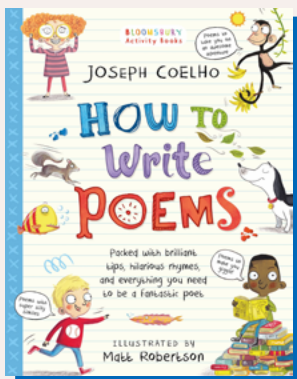

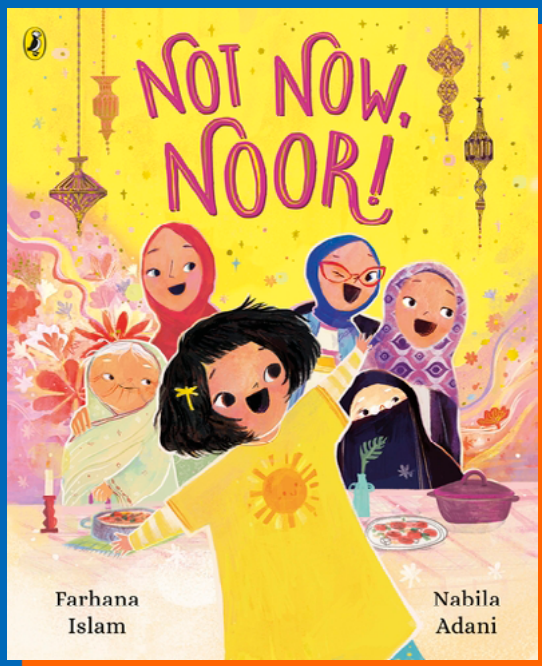

Not Now, Noor! is a warm-hearted introduction to the concept of the hijab, and a loving celebration of Muslim women.

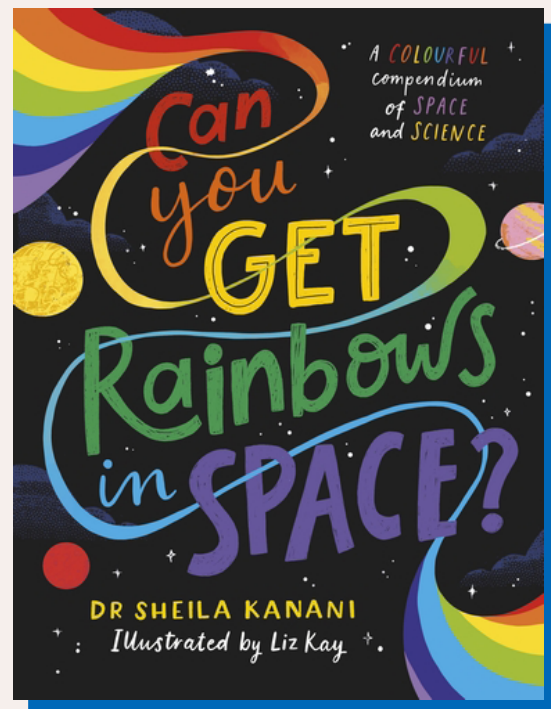

Kwak won second prize in the Macmillan Prize for Illustration 2018.

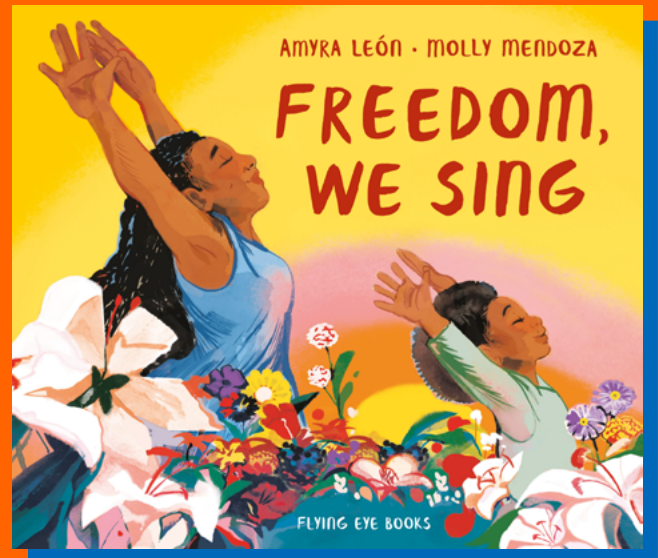

Fauja Singh Keeps Going is a story about grit and determination, and will show young children about the power of believing in yourself and of trying.

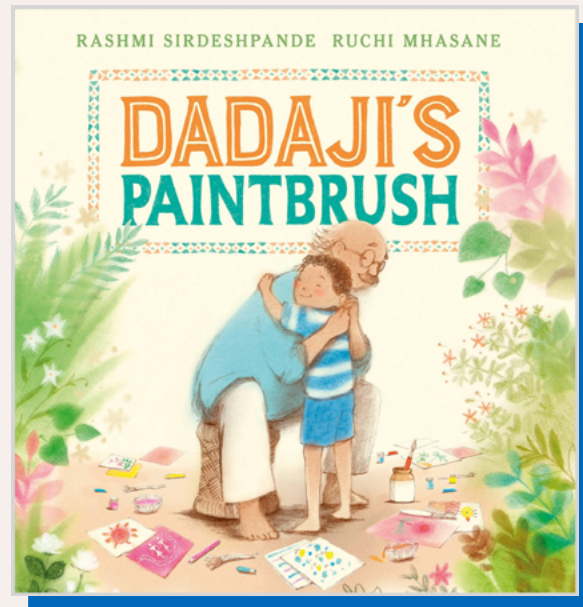

Dadaji's Paintbrush is a good first book to introduce children to concepts of grief and bereavement, and has a focus on continuing a legacy for those who aren't around any more.

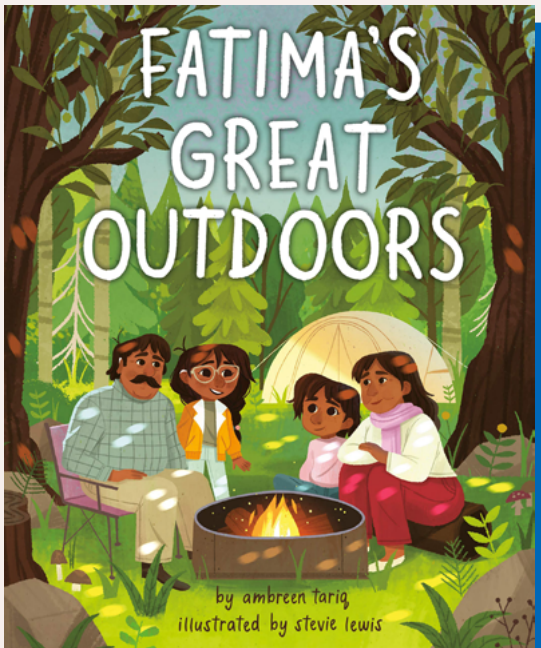

Husband-and-wife writing team Katie and Kevin Tsang's Sam Wu series is all about the title character, who is not afraid of anything. Apart from a big list of things.

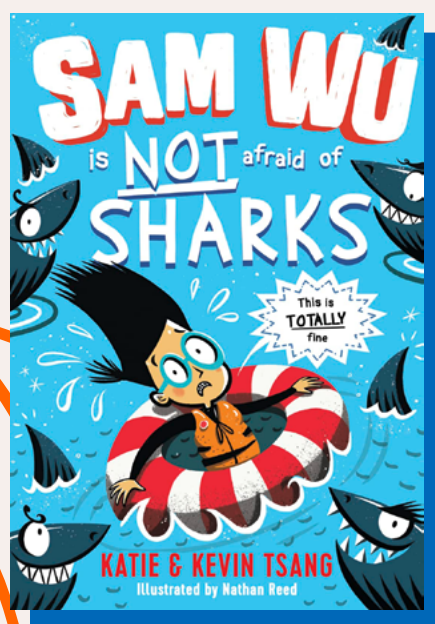
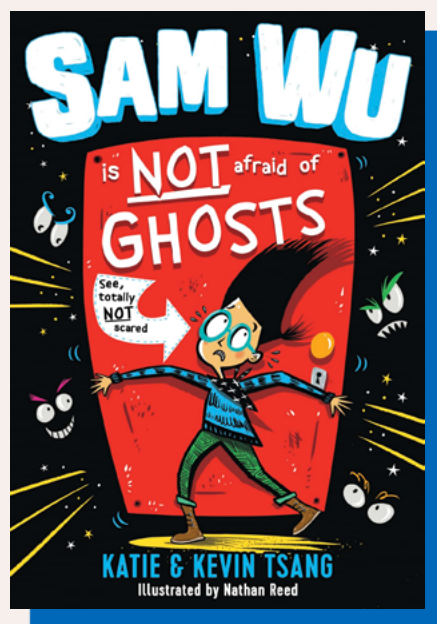
The six books in the series each see Sam tackling a different fear, beginning in *Sam Wu is NOT Afraid of Ghosts!* When a trip to the Space Museum goes terrifyingly wrong, Sam is given the nickname Scaredy-Cat Sam by school bully Ralph. And so Sam begins a mission to prove to Ralph, and all of his friends, that he is a fearless space adventurer.

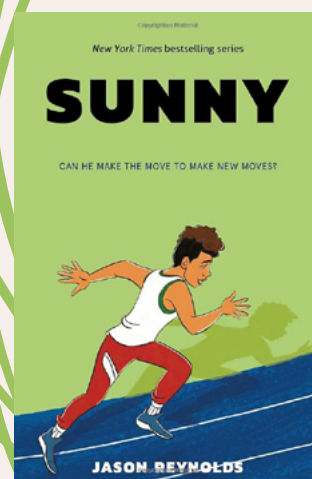
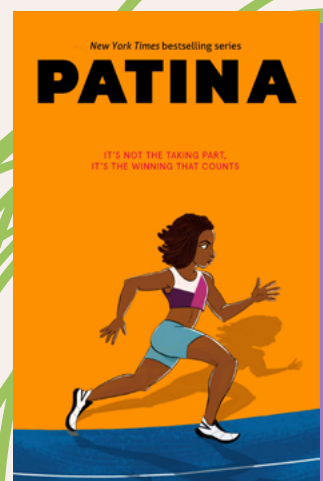
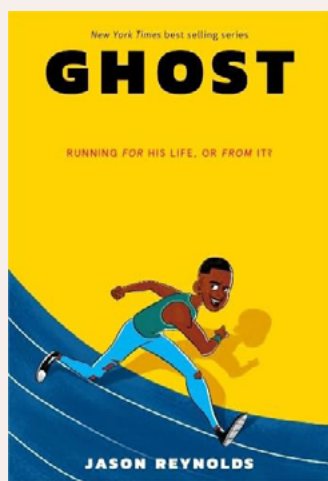
Ghost, Lu, Patina and Sunny are four children from wildly different backgrounds who must learn to work together on their school's athletics team.

Each book in Jason Reynolds' series focuses on a different member of the group and the challenges they face. In *Ghost*, Castle Cranshaw – known as Ghost – has only ever known running, from escaping from his father when he was a young child to running away from his problems. When he meets Coach, the ex-Olympic medallist spots Ghost's natural talent; if Ghost can stay on track, literally and figuratively, he could be the best sprinter in the city.

In *Patina*, Patty runs like a flash, and she has multiple reasons for doing so. Her mother, who she and her sister don't live with anymore, has The Sugar, and Patty is terrified that the disease that took her mum's legs will one day take her away forever. As stress builds in Patty's life, her bad attitude builds too. When Coach places her in a relay team, Patty has to learn to work with and depend on other people.

Sunny is always ready with a bright smile, but underneath he's hiding the guilt he feels at his mother's death while she gave birth to him. The only way Sunny can make his dad proud is to win while running, but Sunny doesn't like to run, and one day stops in the middle of a race. Instead, Sunny wants to dance, and it's only when he discovers a track event that combines running and dance that things begin to get better.

In the final book in the series, Lu knows he can lead Ghost, Patina, Sunny, and the team to victory at the championships, but it might not be as easy as it seems. Suddenly, there are hurdles in Lu's way, and Lu needs to figure out quickly what winning the gold really means.



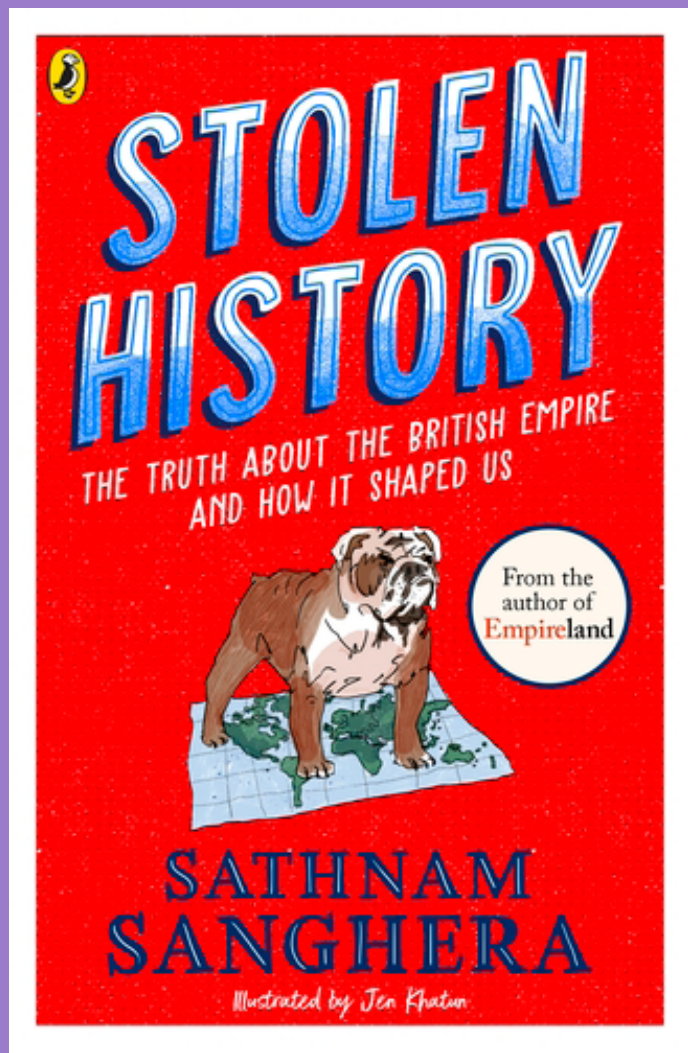

Kurara learns to hunt shikigami – wild paper spirits sought after by the Princess. But soon she begins to question whether the shikigami are just powerful slaves, or whether they are beings with their own souls.

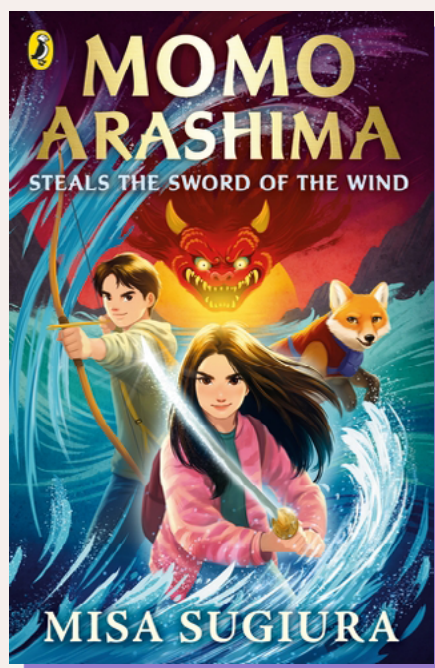

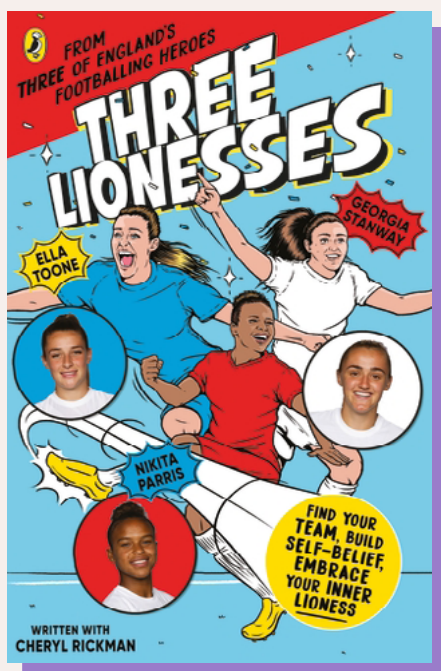
